Public hearing to be held on wind energy ordinance

GRUNDY CENTER- The battle over wind energy in Grundy County isn't over yet. After a 4-3 vote from the Planning and Zoning Commission to remove the language from the zoning ordinance that allowed for the construction of large-scale wind farms, the issue will go to a public hearing on September 6, and the board of supervisors will once again have the final say on the matter.

In 2009, members of the P and Z commission, the board of adjustments and the supervisors formed a committee and eventually recommended adding wind energy conversion systems over 100 kilowatts as a permitted use in an A-2 agricultural district, which was met with little resistance from the public at the time. That, however, changed when RPM Access came to the county with a proposal for a wind farm near Wellburg that was first rejected by the Planning and Zoning Commission but later overruled by the supervisors.

The more recent 45-turbine, 90 megawatt Ivester Wind Farm project, which has not yet been constructed but received approval from the supervisors in April, was met with a wave of strong opposition from some nearby landowners and other Grundy County residents, and Development Director PJ Saliterman told the board that he would need to come back for a second round of rezoning hearings depending on how many land parcels the company could secure. If the ordinance allowing wind energy conversion is repealed, no new projects could begin, and EDF would be forced to determine whether the current project was still economically feasible at all.

Those who voted in favor of repealing the wind energy ordinance during a meeting last week were P and Z Chairman Bryan DeNeui, Jane Katzer, Lee Rittgers and Brad Ohrt, while Tiffany Carson, Keith Sheller and Steve Robertson, all recently appointed members, voted to keep the ordinance as it is. Carson said in a subsequent interview that while she

Grandfather, grandson share special moment at induction ceremony

QUANTICO, VA.- When 84-year-old Korean War veteran Jim Willms of Grundy Center, who served in the Army, heard that his grandson Joseph Drum was joining the Marines, he cracked a couple of jokes in reference to the good-natured rivalry between the branches of the military. There was nothing but respect, however, when the grandfather and grandson shared a salute during Drum's induction ceremony to become a Second Lieutenant on August 6.

“That was really special,” Willms said.

Willms has lived in Grundy County for almost all of his life—he was born in Black Hawk County but grew up on a farm near Dike and


attended Dike High School before being drafted into the Army. After serving with the 45th infantry division, 180th regiment for 16 months, he returned from Korea in 1953, began farming with his brother where he grew up and eventually met his wife, Gloria. They have resided in Grundy Center for the last 23 years.

Joseph's mother Alisa (Willms) Drum grew up in Grundy County before eventually settling in Nixa, Missouri, with her husband Dan, and Joe attended the University of Iowa, graduating in May. Upon graduation, he decided to embark on a rather unconventional post-collegiate journey: joining the military and training through the summer before receiving word that he would be commissioned as a lieutenant in August.

All of his immediate family, hailing from Iowa, Wisconsin, Arizona and Missouri, made the trip to Quantico, which is located in Northern Virginia 1,039 miles from Grundy Center and is home to one of the world's largest Marine Corp bases, for the ceremony, as Jim and Gloria packed into an RV to travel across the country. Each inductee had the opportunity to choose one family member who had served to give a salute during the ceremony, and Joseph chose his grandfather.

According to procedure, because Joe had not yet earned a salute, he was required to give his grandfather a silver dollar, and Willms then saluted his grandson as Joe acknowledged the salute.

Supervisors hear pitch for courthouse themed celebration

GRUNDY CENTER - A representative from KWVL who originally hails from Grundy Center spoke to the Grundy County Board of Supervisors about the possibility of hosting an event to celebrate the 125th anniversary of the courthouse during Monday morning's regular meeting.

Debbie Reynolds took the floor for around 20 minutes and pitched the idea to commemorate the building, which first opened in 1891, and she said that she would like to find a couple of nontraditional sponsors to help fund it. The event itself would likely not be held until 2017, but that would allow work on the new annex building to be finished first. Reynolds suggested creating large canvas birthday cards and hosting a weekend arts and music festival that would include a cook off challenge, local artists and musicians, a light show and a fundraising opportunity for EMTs, law enforcement and local fire departments.

“(I want to) embrace the opportunity to come in and shed light into the area (and) find the jewels that people tend not to realize because they're here every day,” she said.

All of the supervisors seemed to

agree that public funds should not be put toward the celebration but liked the idea as a whole.

“I don't think we should use public funds for this, but I think

we should be involved; and I think that's something that we should get on board with to some degree.”

One person injured in motorcycle crash near Dike

DIKE – Following a car-motorcycle accident near Dike last Wednesday afternoon, a Waterloo man has been taken to the hospital, where he was treated for his injuries.

The accident occurred just after 4:30 p.m. on Wednesday, at the junction of D-19 (160th Street) and T-65 (X Avenue), approximately three miles east of Dike.

Jeffrey Cosby, 49, of Waterloo, was headed eastbound on D-19 on his motorcycle when he slowed to make a left turn onto T-65 and was struck in the rear by a vehicle driven by Jeffrey Hall, 49, of Grundy Center.

Grundy County Sheriff Rick Penning said that Hall became distracted while driving, and didn't see Cosby turning until it was too late.

Cosby, who wasn't wearing a helmet at the time, was thrown from his motorcycle onto the shoulder of the road. He sustained multiple injuries, including a dislocated shoulder and fractured wrist, and was taken to Covenant Hospital. Hall was not injured.

The investigation of the accident was handled by the Grundy County Sheriff's Office. Also assisting was the Dike Fire and Ambulance, Sartori Paramedics and Iowa State Patrol.

Supervisor Mark Schildroth said.

Reynolds added that she hopes to bring in visitors from other local communities as well as some from outside of the county. After some discussion, she received an informal go-ahead to proceed with the plans and report back to the board periodically on the progress.

County Engineer Gary Mauer presented several items to the board for approval, including a low fuel quote of \$11,859.60 from Agvantage Farm Services of Waverly, and a revision to

the five-year construction program that will move the replacement project for bridge F7 from the next fiscal year to the current one. Both motions carried unanimously.

The board received an animal confinement permit application in Section 36 of Palermo Township with zoning administrator Carie Sager, who reported that it scored 445 points in the Master Matrix, barely exceeding the required minimum of 440. The building will be the third on the property and bring the total number of hogs there to around 7,500. After a

brief discussion, a motion from Chuck Bakker to approve the application passed 5-0.

A public hearing has been set for August 29 to amend zoning ordinances related to special exemptions for A-1 and A-2 home industry permits that are larger than originally intended but still not big enough to warrant a commercial permit. The change will benefit the Old 57 Dairy and "The Barn" events center, which is set to receive a special exemption after owner Mindy Hamann met with the supervisors to clear up some issues last month. All events scheduled there will go on as planned.

IN OTHER BUSINESS, the board:

- Approved the Clerk of Court's July report.
- Approved a request from the Grundy County Chamber of Commerce to use the courthouse grounds.
- Approved the second amended 2016 Military Credit Applications and authorized the chairperson to sign the same.
- Approved the final official statement for General Obligation Urban Renewal Bonds, series 2016B, and authorized the chairperson to sign the same.

which included a parade and a ceremony, was when an official noticed that Willms was wearing his Korean War veteran hat and moved him to a closer, shaded seat. It was estimated that around 3,000 people attended the ceremony, but only three of them were Korean War veterans. Speakers included General Robert B. Neller, Colonel Julie L. Nethercot and Brigadier General Michael S. Groen. The family took the time to see some historical sites in Washington, D.C., before returning home late last week. They greatly enjoyed the experience and the reminder that even in a time when Americans are divided on a host of major issues, patriotism is still alive and well.

"As we stood and listened to our national anthem and watched our flag wave, we realized that we do live in a great country," Jim's wife Gloria said in written remarks. "And with God's help, we will keep it so!"

SportsPlus opens Grundy Center location

GRUNDY CENTER — The Marshalltown sports medicine and physical therapy center SportsPlus recently opened a new location in Grundy Center, where employees are preparing for busy season as fall sports roll around at Grundy Center High School.

The new business, which is located at 606 E 1 Street, has officially been open since June 1, though they are still working on plans for a grand opening.

SportsPlus owner and director of services Scott Carnahan said that he's very excited to be able to bring his business to Grundy Center.

"The community felt like a great fit for us," Carnahan said. "Everyone is very supportive of small business here, and the city is great to work with. They really worked with us to find the right location."

So far the bulk of customers have been athletes, Carnahan said, but athletes aren't the only ones they serve.

"If you're alive and something hurts, we can help you," Carnahan said.

Currently, SportsPlus offers rehabilitation for any number of orthopedic conditions such as sprains, strains, fractures and tendonitis, as well as rehabilitation for post surgical conditions, sports injuries, work injuries and more.

This fall, they plan to offer a Saturday morning injury clinic for any high school athletes who feel like they may have injured themselves during a Friday night football game

or volleyball match.

The clinic will consist of a free screening, and advice on steps to take next.

Aside from their regular services, SportsPlus also carries contracts with several area schools — including Gladbrook-Reinbeck, Aplington-Parkersburg, AGWSR and North Tama — for athletic training, so they are already familiar with the surrounding communities and student athletes in those areas.

Although Grundy Center High School has a contract with a different organization, Carnahan said if the opportunity arises for SportsPlus to sign a contract with GCHS, he thinks that his team could do a great job providing quality service to local athletes.

"We believe that the difference between us and [another provider] is the way that the care is delivered,"

Carnahan said. "We take a different approach to things. We don't chase symptoms, we work hard to get to the root of problems. Where many places have you in and out within 45 minutes, our average sessions last around an hour to an hour and a half."

Currently, there are six employees working out of the Grundy Center office, including Scott Carnahan and John Richter in the physical therapy department, Kristina Horner and Aaron Krejci in the athletic training department, Maddie Olson who works as an aide, and Jody Latwesen who works as the office's administrative assistant. Carnahan added that they are currently seeking additional athletic trainers and physical therapists for both the Grundy Center and Marshalltown locations.

explained. "Then he would ride on Saturdays and Sundays for cycle-cross, and they would do biking trips up the mountain."

Joe said that most recently, Bill had graduated to the pro-class level of cycling within his cycle-cross club. Cycle-cross, he described, is like moto-cross but with bicycles. Riders must go through mud and dirt, over hills and even up into the mountains and other extreme environments — all on a bike.

"He got one pro race in [for cycle-cross], and he would've been cycling against the pros this year," Joe said.

But on June 25, while out riding his bike in Boulder, Bill was killed after a drunk driver swerved into the bike lane and hit him.

Almost immediately, everyone who knew Bill gathered together to support his family, and honor his memory.

Described as "a beaming light, incredibly kind, insanely brilliant, joyfully funny, and [someone who] excelled in absolutely everything he ever did and yet remained the most humble and perfect person," Bill's funeral service was attended by not just family and friends, but by former classmates, colleagues and neighbors from across the country.

"I remember his old neighbors from California came to the service," said another of Bill's friends and former classmates, Nick Suender. "How many people would have their old neighbors from that far away come to something like this? That just shows you how much he touches people, by just being a good person. I can't even remember my old neighbors."

But wherever Bill went, he made an impact on those around him; and now, those people from around the country are gathering together to remember him in the best ways that they can.

In Boulder, his cycling friends organized several bike rides in his honor, and his family got together to finish what would have been his next project — building a tree house for his three sons, Blake (9), Landon (6), and Owen (3).

"Blake came over to me and said 'Grandpa will you build me a tree house? Dad promised to build me a tree house this summer and it's not gonna happen now,'" Joe said.

So Bill's father, brothers-in-law and several friends got together to build a dream tree house for his sons, much like the one that Joe built for Bill and his friends when they were boys.

Across Iowa, friends made tributes to him during RAGBRAI, and several of his closest friends, including Adair, made a pact to ride RAGBRAI in his honor next year.

In Reinbeck, Bill's former classmates decided to honor him by building a memorial at the park on Main Street that he created for his Eagle Scout project when he was in high school.

Adair remembers when Bill first came up with the idea to build the park, and how he put his all into it just like he did with everything else.

"The rest of us were thinking of painting fire hydrants and Bill was like, 'I'm gonna create this whole park out of scratch,'" Adair said. "He put his all into it; he did all the planning, organizing, and fundraising. Then we helped lay bricks and everything else, but he was definitely the motivator who kept us all going. He was all in. It kind of epitomized the way he approached life."

After Adair and others from the G-R Class of '99 successfully campaigned to rename Bill's park from "Main Street Park" to "Bill Davis Park," the next step in their plan includes building his memorial there — which the class is currently fundraising for through a Go Fund Me page and an account at Lincoln Savings

Bank in Reinbeck.

The memorial for Bill will feature a walkway in the park that leads up to a plaque and a metal silhouette sculpture of him. They also plan to install a bike rack at the park. They have already finished the first part of the project, building the walkway, and Adair said they hope to have the plaque and silhouette done this summer, though it may take a little longer than that.

Aside from the memorial at the park, another way that Bill's friends, family and classmates are remembering him is by adopting his personal motto: "Don't forget to be awesome."

In the mudroom of his home in Boulder, Bill had a framed poster with that quote on it, which his sons would see each day before they went to school and that he would see before going out to start his day.

Across Facebook, many of Bill's friends, colleagues and former classmates are posting and sharing pictures of Bill with his tagline, "Don't forget to be awesome."

Adair said that now, he has the poster framed in his office and his home.

"So do I," said Aaron Thede, another G-R grad and friend of Bill's.

"I do, too," Suender said. "It's just one more way that we can remember Bill and remember to be the best we can in whatever we're doing, whether it's being a husband or a father, or working, or just riding a bike."

the wind turbines, she sees them as an overall positive in generating revenue and economic development.

"(Turbines) are all over the state of Iowa. They're not going away," she said. "We're not forcing (farmers) to put them on their property. They don't have to do it, so I don't think we should take it away from those who want to do it."

At Monday's supervisors meeting, a vote to set the hearing date passed just 3-2, with Jim Ross and Harlyn Riekema voting no. Chairwoman Barb Smith noted, however, that the board is required to hold a public hearing regardless according to county attorney Erika Allen.

Riekema and Ross both offered strong opinions on what they saw as a continuous effort to undermine the rights of local landowners.

"We've had three circuses, and now we're tentatively giving approval to this," Riekema said, in reference to the past controversies.

"I don't think that we should sit here and pray God and tell people what they can and cannot do with their land," Ross added.

At press time, requests for comment from the four commission members who voted to repeal the ordinance had not been returned, but they mainly cited a desire to preserve agricultural land and concern about what would happen after the turbines are decommissioned years down the road during the meeting, according to a source who attended.

The hearing has been set for September 6 at 9:00 a.m., and it could be moved to the courthouse if additional

City of Reinbeck approves artist to create mural

REINBECK — After sifting through plenty of applications and portfolios, the city of Reinbeck recently announced that they've found just the artist for the job.

Waverly-based illustrator Dan Hatala has been commissioned to paint the mural in the city's Main Street Pocket Park, now named Bill Davis Park.

The mural project is intended to honor the city's past and to add a unique aesthetic addition to the downtown area that can be appreciated by both visitors and citizens alike.

The council specifically asked that several old photos showing black-and-white, horse and buggy era scenes of downtown Reinbeck be incorporated into the mural, which will stretch across the 12' by 48' wall.

Hatala's plans for the mural, shown in the photo above, include six scenes from the council's vintage photos, as an ode to the city's past.

As an artist, Hatala is no stranger to the commercial aspect of art, and he has an impressive resume to back

up his work.

An Iowa-native, Hatala has spent his entire working career as an artist. After studying commercial art, he started his career as an Art Director at a Midwest agency, and later became a Senior Illustrator at a well-known art studio.

During his time as an illustrator, he worked for clients such as Danbury Mint, Masterpieces Puzzles, Budweiser, Coors, Pizza Hut, AMC Theaters, Ducks Unlimited, Sears and many others. In the late 90's, he started doing freelance work out of his home in Waverly. He has continued his freelance work ever since, including projects such as the mural here in Reinbeck.

City of Reinbeck Administrative Assistant Dana Schoenbeck said that Hatala plans to start working on the mural this Friday, and weather permitting, he hopes to have it finished by the end of the month, or by no later than the September 17 deadline.

The mural will be unveiled on September 24 during the 5th annual Reinbeck Art Festival.

Conrad council gets fire station update, approves pay request

CONRAD- The Conrad city council discussed the ongoing fire station project at the Smith Development and approved a pay request for the contractor at last Thursday night's regular meeting.

According to councilman Ryan Callaway, Brycon, LLC, is about two weeks behind on work, attributing the delay to weather and a lack of manpower. He added, however, that he believes things are still going well overall, and the project could still potentially be finished before the October 31 deadline.

"I felt like they understood that we're watching, and everybody's watching," Callaway said. "They want to give us a good product."

Bob Mickelson of the IS Architects Group made a site visit and noted a few minor concerns, but Callaway said that he was confident that

they would be addressed. The fire station committee is scheduled to meet again on September 8 just before the next regular council meeting. After a brief discussion, a pay request for \$51,775 was approved by a 4-0 vote (Diane Miller was absent).

"I think things are going as well as they can be," Callaway said.

City maintenance man Bruce Marble informed the council that the storm sewer on South Main Street near Ritchie Industries is in need of repair as there is a hole in front of it, and the curb is settling and falling away. Central Iowa Televising and Municipal Pipe and Tool both provided estimates to assess the area, and the council voted to go with CIT at a rate of \$900 for approximately three hours.

Parking on Wilhelm Street came up later in the meeting, and council members noted that it has become somewhat congested due to the car

wash, apartments and day care facility. Without making any official decisions, they discussed some possible remedies, including limiting how long a trailer or vehicle can be parked in one spot. Currently, the limit is 45 days, but it was added that it's difficult to enforce because of the long period of time. The issue will be revisited during the September meeting.

"(The ordinance) needs to be practical and enforceable," Councilman Brad Murty said.

IN OTHER BUSINESS, the council:

- Approved the annual street and finance report.
- Approved the final plat at the Smith Development.
- Approved claims for payment and clerk's reports as part of the consent agenda.
- Acknowledged the receipt of four building permit applications.

BCLUW board approves changes to Sunday practices

CONRAD- After discussing the matter extensively over the last few months, the BCLUW school board voted to approve changes to the activities practice policy during Monday morning's meeting.

Under the new policy, which passed a first reading last month, practices on Sundays will only be allowed in a window from 5:00 to 8:00 p.m. Practices will not be allowed on most major holidays unless a special exception is requested. It was noted that if students wished to come in a few minutes early to set up and prepare, that would be accepted, but that time would need to be limited without expanding the practice by a half hour, an hour or more. A motion to approve the change passed by a 4-0 vote (LJ Kopsa, Brian Feldpausch and Eric Engle were absent). A change to the good conduct code, which will change one of the criteria for a reduction in penalty from "community service" to "school based community service" was also approved.

Earlier in the meeting, the board voted to approve the fundraisers for the upcoming school year but made sure to point out some key revisions that aim to rein in some of the excesses that have occurred in the past. Athletic director Lynne Silver said that there will be no more door to door sales in Marshall-

town, no selling after 9:00 p.m. and more rigorous monitoring of where the funds go due to complaints that some student athletes were profiting off of them.

In personnel news, the board approved several changes, including the hiring of Rachel Bachman as a middle school special education aide, Stanley Moberg as a full-time bus driver (pending negative drug test), Dawn Volhouse as a special education aide and Steve Hedland as an elementary custodian and bus driver (pending a background check and negative drug test). The resignation of Staci Switzer as the assistant softball coach was also accepted.

The following volunteer coaches received approval for the upcoming year: Dustin Peterson for junior high football, Morgan and Shelby Trinkle for cheerleading, Ashlee Higgins for volleyball, Dave Willett for high school football, Dylan Humpel for basketball and Andy Carman for high school track.

The annual agreement with Iowa Valley Community College to provide college level courses at BCLUW was approved unanimously.

Superintendent Ben Petty reported that overall revenues are up from last year, at \$6,756,000 compared to \$6.69 million, and he added that the nutrition fund is up substantially. Petty said that small cutbacks in support staff and early retirement packages have allowed

the district to avoid making large, painful cuts.

He also noted that due to a high needs special education student moving into the district (without any notification to BCLUW officials) but continuing to attend Waukee High School last year, he is currently disputing a \$50,000 bill that BCLUW received from Waukee.

"It's not something we'll let slide. We'll battle that and see how it works out," he said.

Silver reported that co-head wrestling coach Stacy Simpson is also looking for a few possible additions to the new wrestling room. The board received a summary of the 2016 summer recreation program from Curt Paugh for review.

During his comments at the end of the meeting, Petty said that the legislative platform issues that he would like the Iowa Association of School Boards (IASB) to advocate for this year are research based initiatives, supporting standards for learning, adequate and timely school funding, setting supplemental state aid as required and keeping the state penny tax (SAVE) for buildings, grounds and infrastructure in place.

The next regular meeting will be held on September 19 at 5:30 p.m. School starts on August 24.



Back to school ... eventually ... maybe

Like clockwork, back to school time has rolled around again.

As August wanes to an end, parents tackle last minute back to school shopping and school kids spend their last precious days of summer at the pool before they're forced to go back to the classroom for another year.

Meanwhile, the recent high school grads are rushing to Target to pick out their matching XL twin comforter and sheet set for their bunk bed, along with a plethora of brightly colored dorm room decorations - ready to begin the next step in their life.

Well, most of the recent high school grads that is.

Some may choose not to go to college, opting instead to join the workforce. Others, though, may choose to follow the increasingly popular trend of a "gap year," a predominantly European tradition that has found its way to America.

A gap year is just what it sounds like; after graduating high school, students take a year off, sometimes to pursue travel or to volunteer or to work or to pursue a special project, entering college the following year.

Throughout Europe, this is a very normal thing to do, and I knew several European exchange students in college who could (and did) personally vouch for it.

But it's not just European institutions that are pushing for gap years. There are organizations, such as the American Gap Association, as well as top U.S. universities that openly promote students taking gap year before entering college.

One of the most notable supporters, prestigious Harvard University encourages students to "defer enrollment for one year to travel, pursue a special project or activity, work, or spend time in another meaningful way."

On Harvard's admissions website they have published an essay titled "Time Out or Burn Out for the Next Generation," that details why they think students should take a gap year.

In the essay, the authors state, "[Harvard] students who had taken a year off found the experience so valuable that they would advise all Harvard students to consider it. Harvard's overall graduation rate of 98 percent is among the highest in the nation, perhaps in part because so many students take time off."

The essay states that not only does a gap year give students time to relax from the pressures of school and "breathe," but it expands their experiences and puts learning into a different perspective.

One particularly notable Harvard student-to-be that will be following the school's advice and taking a gap year is Malia Obama.

Back in May when the president announced his eldest daughter would be taking a gap year, the reaction from the media and the public spanned all sides of the spectrum.

Some people acknowledged the announcement with contempt, reasoning that gap years aren't practical unless you're extremely rich, and they're just another way to coddle the already entitled youth of today by letting them escape the real world for another year.

Others brought up the argument that most students who take a year off

have a harder time completing their education, or they simply don't go back to school.

Others yet look at gap years in a favorable light, noting that this can be an important time of self exploration for a young person deciding what they want to do with their life, adding that it's worked so well in Europe.

Gap years have their pros and cons just like any other issue, but while it may work in Europe, that's not to say that it will work in America.

I completely agree with the idea that time off will expand a student's experience and put their learning into perspective, and I'm all for that. Having done a little international travel myself, I can see that even in a short amount of time spent traveling, a person's cultural relativism expands substantially, and I can't even imagine how wonderful it would be to spend a whole year doing that.

Personally I would have loved to take a gap year, but realistically, it wouldn't have worked for me. College is expensive in the U.S., and with tuition rates rising each year, taking a year off can end up costing the average student big bucks.

In Europe, college tuition is nearly dirt cheap and even free in many cases, so it works for students to take a year off to pursue travel, volunteerism and other projects. If our system was like the European system, I think a lot more people would take gap years, and maybe we would have fewer people change their plan halfway through college, or even halfway through their career.

As for the argument that many students who take a gap year won't return to college, I could argue that someone who isn't motivated enough to return to school probably wouldn't be motivated enough to finish in the first place, and that it depends widely on the personality of the person.

If the person is motivated, the break might be just the burst of inspiration they needed before continuing on to college. If the person isn't naturally motivated, maybe a break year isn't the best idea for them, and maybe college isn't the best idea for them. After all, there are plenty of people - even people I graduated from high school with - who spend thousands of dollars on college tuition only to drop out in the middle of their sophomore or junior year.

I've seen some of these former classmates since then, and some of them have told me they had a change of plans, but felt like they were already too far in to change majors. Not to mention the thousands of dollars (that they don't have) that they would need to essentially begin schooling all over again.

Needless to say, there are pros and cons to the subject of gap years, just like there is with any situation. In theory it seems like a good idea, but in reality, I'm not quite sure if it would work for average students here in the U.S., even if we'd like it to. New Hartford man turns class art into BIG book

NEW HARTFORD — As a teacher at Peet Junior High School in Cedar Falls, Bill Close was known far and wide for the larger-than-life art projects that his students created. Now the New Hartford resident has turned the artwork into a book that he is selling in an effort to give back to others.

"Early in my teaching career I discovered one thing about junior high students — they loved things that were either really, really small and miniature or really big. That seemed to turn it on," Close said.

"I was always fascinated by pop art and Claes Oldenburg," he said. "Claes Oldenburg build monumental pop art structures all over the world. There are three in this vicinity, the spoon and cherry at the Walker Sculpture Garden in Minneapolis, Des Moines had the Crusoe Umbrella and in the Kansas City Art Institute had the giant shuttlecocks on the lawn. That always appealed to me.

The megasculptures that Close and his students created between 1979 and 2002 became a phenomenon in Cedar Falls, drawing public interest and creating life-long memories for the students that were part of them. He said the idea came as he was trying to discover how to get through to a few of his students in 1979.

"I had a class that was predominantly ninth-grade boys, good kids but I felt that they weren't really buying into the art curriculum I was providing," he said. "At that time the ladies in the cafeteria, the head of the food services in Cedar Falls, asked me if one of my art classes could do something to decorate the cafeteria for National School Lunch Week. I had no idea there was such a thing as National School Lunch Week but I had an idea.

"So I approached this ninth-grade art class and I told them 'The cafeteria ladies want us to decorate the cafeteria, would you guys be interested in making some posters?' I knew they wouldn't, their eyes kind of rolled, and I said 'That's the response I thought I was going to get, but I have another idea. We could take this whole thing up a notch or two.' I said, 'How would you like to be involved in building the world's largest school lunch? So big that it would fill the whole stage.' They immediately got excited about that."

The first megasculpture filled the 15-foot by 20- or 30-foot stage with a lunch tray, milk carton, green beans, hamburger, carrots and celery, desert, utensils ... everything. Work was divided among the groups of students and each got to take home part of the sculpture when the project was done.

ect was done.

"It was very successful, the kids loved it, we got a great reaction," Close said. "I got a kick out of the cafeteria ladies, they got their picture taken and they all were wearing identical corsages."

"The project was so successful that I knew that I wanted to continue this project, but I also wanted to be able to see it, so the first decision we made was that we were going to begin to display them outside," he said.

The next megasculpture came during American Education Week.

"We settled on a No. 2 pencil because every kid in the state of Iowa that takes the Iowa Basic Skills test has to have that No. 2 pencil," he said.

To make the pencil a true megasculpture, the students scaled it 72 times actual size. That, however, would have made the pencil about a half mile long, according to Close, so they chose to break it in half and put each half into the ground.

Later projects included a cruise ship, computer, Olympic Torch and even a Master padlock where they "locked up the school."

Close said the project had incredible support from both the school and the community.

"Through the years we needed to get sponsors because the sculptures were getting bigger and more complex we had businesses lined up waiting for their turn to sponsor the megasculptures," he said.

"School administrators immediately saw the educational value of what we were doing and the public turned out," he said. "It became an

event. It's part of Cedar Falls' history."

After retirement, Close said he wanted to put together a book to recount the projects. Jean Melick provided most of the photos of the megasculptures. It was he sorted through the photos and comments he had compiled from more than 60 students who had been part of the projects that Close realized he would need some help putting the book together. A friend referred Close to Hawkeye Community College instructor and graphics designer Jerry Grier, who became an integral part of the project.

"We hit it off right away and I showed him some of the pictures I had and he found the whole megasculpture thing intriguing," Close said. "He said I'll do this book but it's going to take a lot of work."

Close and Grier met three days a week for five or six hours per day. When the two weren't meeting, Close was working on information about the pictures and Grier was working with them in Photoshop.

"I love (the book)," Close said. "It exceeded my expectations. And it's been extremely well received in the community."

Proceeds from the book are being used to fund the Bill Close/Ron Streed smArt Start Scholarship Fund, which will be used to provide an annual scholarship to a Cedar Falls High School senior planning to pursue a college degree in art.

The book can be purchased from both Barn Happy and Gallery 106 in Cedar Falls as well as from the Cedar Falls Historical Society.

BOARD OF SUPERVISORS PROCEEDINGS

The Grundy County Board of Supervisors met in regular session on August 8, 2016, at 9:00 A.M. Chairperson Smith called the meeting to order with the following members present: Baker, Ross, Riekena, and Schildroth.

Motion was made by Ross and seconded by Bakker to approve the minutes of the previous meeting. Carried unanimously.

At 9:02 a.m., the chairperson opened the public hearing regarding an amendment to the County Development/Zoning Ordinance. After hearing everyone wishing to speak in favor of or against the amendment, the chairperson closed the hearing. It was noted that no written comments had been received.

Motion was made by Ross and seconded by Bakker to accept the first reading of Ordinance #2017-1, an ordinance amending Ordinance No. 2009-5 - Grundy County, Iowa, Development Ordinance as follows: Be It Ordained By the Board of Supervisors of Grundy County, Iowa: SECTION 1. PURPOSE. The purpose of this Ordinance is to amend the Official Zoning Maps of Ordinance No. 2009-5 - Grundy County, Iowa, Development Ordinance. SECTION 2. AMENDMENT. The Official Zoning Maps of Ordinance No. 2009-5 Grundy County, Iowa, Development Ordinance are hereby amended by reclassifying the following described real property from an A-1 Agricultural District to M- Manufacturing for purposes of allowing Boulder Contracting to operate a contracting business: Parcel 37-B located in the S 3/4 1/2 SW 1/4 of Section 19, Township 87 North, Range 16, West of the 5th P.M. as shown in Book 73-G, Page 182 of the County Recorder's Office. SECTION 3. REPEALER. All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances heretofore enacted by the Board of Supervisors of Grundy County, Iowa, in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby expressly repealed. SECTION 4. SEPARABILITY OF PROVISIONS. It is the intention of the Board of Supervisors that each section, paragraph, sentence, clause and provision of this Ordinance is separable, and if any such provision is held unconstitutional or invalid for any reason, such decision shall not affect the remainder of this Ordinance or any part thereof other than that affected by such decision. SECTION 5. EFFECTIVE DATE. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication as provided by law. Roll call vote was as follows: Ayes - Bakker, Ross, Riekena, Schildroth, and Smith. Nays - none.

Motion was made by Ross and seconded by Schildroth to suspend the rules and move Ordinance #2017-1 from first to third reading and adoption. Roll call vote was as follows: Ayes - Bakker, Ross, Riekena, Schildroth, and Smith. Nays - none. Ordinance adopted.

Motion was made by Bakker and seconded by Schildroth to approve Utility Permit Application No. 8-08-16 to REC of Grundy Center, Iowa, on upgrading the electric service at 18992 130th Street along 130th Street in Section 21 of Pleasant Valley Township and to authorize the chairperson to sign said application. Carried unanimously.

Motion was made by Bakker and seconded by Ross to introduce Resolution #9-2016/2017 as follows: WHEREAS: The Grundy County Board of Supervisors is empowered under authority of the Code of Iowa to impose weight limitations on highway structures under their jurisdiction. NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Grundy County Board of Supervisors that the following structures be posted at their listed load limits. Bridge located near N 14 Corner, Sec. 28-89-17, Pleasant Valley Township, (C-24) - CLOSE BRIDGE; Bridge located near W1/4 Corner, Sec. 10-88-17, Colfax Township, (F-07) - CLOSE BRIDGE. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that all resolutions or parts of resolutions in the provisions of this resolution are hereby repealed. The vote on the resolution was as follows: Ayes - Bakker, Ross, Riekena, Schildroth, and Smith. Nays - none. Resolution adopted.

Gary Mauer, County Engineer, reviewed department matters with the Board.

Board Member Riekena introduced the following resolution entitled "RESOLUTION APPOINTING BANKERS TRUST COMPANY OF DES MOINES, IOWA, TO SERVE AS PAYING AGENT, BOND REGISTRAR, AND TRANSFER AGENT, APPROVING THE PAYING AGENT AND BOND REGISTRAR AND TRANSFER AGENT AGREEMENT AND AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTION OF THE AGREEMENT", and moved that the resolution be adopted. Board Member Schildroth seconded the motion to adopt. The roll was called and the vote was AYES: Bakker, Ross, Riekena, Schildroth, and Smith. NAYS: None.

Whereupon, the Chairperson declared said Resolution duly adopted as follows: Resolution #9-2016/2017 RESOLUTION APPOINTING BANKERS TRUST COMPANY OF DES MOINES, IOWA, TO SERVE AS PAYING AGENT, BOND REGISTRAR, AND TRANSFER AGENT, APPROVING THE PAYING AGENT AND BOND REGISTRAR AND TRANSFER AGENT AGREEMENT AND AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTION OF THE AGREEMENT

WHEREAS, \$1,150,000 General Obligation Urban Renewal Bonds, Series 2016B, dated August 23, 2016, have been sold and action should now be taken to provide for the maintenance of records, registration of certificates and payment of principal and interest in connection with the issuance of the Bonds; and WHEREAS, this Board has deemed that the services offered by Bankers Trust Company of Des Moines, Iowa, are necessary for compliance with rules, regulations, and requirements governing the registration, transfer and payment of registered bonds; and WHEREAS, a Paying Agent, Bond Registrar and Transfer Agent Agreement (hereafter "Agreement") has been prepared to be entered into between the County and Bankers Trust Company.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF GRUNDY COUNTY, STATE OF IOWA: 1. That Bankers Trust Company of Des Moines, Iowa, is hereby appointed to serve as Paying Agent, Bond Registrar and Transfer Agent in connection with the issuance of \$1,150,000 General Obligation Urban Renewal Bonds, Series 2016B, dated August 23, 2016. 2. That the Agreement with Bankers Trust Company of Des Moines, Iowa, is hereby approved and that the Chairperson and Auditor are authorized to sign the Agreement on behalf of the County.

Board Member Bakker introduced the following Resolution entitled "RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING AND PROVIDING FOR THE ISSUANCE OF \$1,150,000 GENERAL OBLIGATION URBAN RENEWAL BONDS, SERIES 2016B, AND LEVYING A TAX TO PAY SAID BONDS; APPROVAL OF THE TAX EXEMPTION CERTIFICATE AND CONTINUING DISCLOSURE CERTIFICATE" and moved that it be adopted. Board Member Ross seconded the motion to adopt, and the roll being called thereon, the vote was as follows: AYES: Bakker, Ross, Riekena, Schildroth, and Smith. NAYS: None.

Whereupon, the Chairperson declared said Resolution duly adopted as follows: Resolution #9-2016/2017 RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING AND PROVIDING FOR THE ISSUANCE OF \$1,150,000 GENERAL OBLIGATION URBAN RENEWAL BONDS, SERIES 2016B, AND LEVYING A TAX TO PAY SAID BONDS; APPROVAL OF THE TAX EXEMPTION CERTIFICATE AND CONTINUING DISCLOSURE CERTIFICATE

WHEREAS, the Issuer is a political subdivision, organized and exists under and by virtue of the laws and Constitution of the State of Iowa; and WHEREAS, the Issuer is in need of funds to pay costs of aiding in the planning, undertaking and carrying out of urban renewal projects under the authority of Iowa Code chapter 403 and the Urban Renewal Plan for the Grundy County Annex Urban Renewal Area, as amended, including demolition of a current aged structure and construction of a new Grundy

County Courthouse Annex to house services including, but not limited to, Mental Health, General Assistance, Chemical Dependency, Juvenile Court Services, Human Services and Public Health, essential county urban renewal purpose(s), and it is deemed necessary and advisable that General Obligation Urban Renewal Bonds, to the amount of not to exceed \$1,400,000 be authorized for said purpose(s); and WHEREAS, pursuant to notice published as required by Section 331.443 of the Code of Iowa, this Board has held a public meeting and hearing upon the proposal to institute proceedings for the issuance of said Bonds, and no petitions for referendum having been received, the Board is therefore now authorized to proceed with the issuance of said Bonds for such purpose(s); and WHEREAS, pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 75 of the Code of Iowa, the above mentioned Bonds were heretofore sold at public sale and action should now be taken to issue said Bonds conforming to the terms and conditions of the best bid received at the advertised public sale.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF GRUNDY COUNTY, STATE OF IOWA: Section 1. Definitions. The following terms shall have the following meanings in this Resolution unless the text expressly or by necessary implication requires otherwise: "Authorized Denominations" shall mean \$5,000 or any integral multiple thereof. "Beneficial Owner" shall mean, whenever used with respect to a Bond, the person in whose name such Bond is recorded as the beneficial owner of such Bond by a Participant on the records of such Participant or such person's subrogee. "Blanket Issuer Letter of Representations" shall mean the Representation Letter from the Issuer to DTC, with respect to the Bonds. "Bond Fund" shall mean the fund created in Section 3 of this Resolution. "Bonds" shall mean \$1,150,000 General Obligation Urban Renewal Bonds, Series 2016B, authorized to be issued by this Resolution. "Cede & Co." shall mean Cede & Co., the nominee of DTC, and any successor nominee of DTC with respect to the Bonds. "Continuing Disclosure Certificate" shall mean that certain Continuing Disclosure Certificate approved under the terms of this Resolution and to be executed by the Issuer and dated the date of issuance and delivery of the Bonds, as originally executed and as it may be amended from time to time in accordance with the terms thereof. "Depository Bonds" shall mean the Bonds as issued in the form of one global certificate for each maturity, registered in the Registration Books maintained by the Registrar in the name of DTC or its nominee. "DTC" shall mean The Depository Trust Company, New York, New York, which will act as security depository for the Bond pursuant to the Representation Letter. "Issuer" and "County" shall mean Grundy County, State of Iowa. "Participants" shall mean those broker-dealers, banks and other financial institutions for which DTC holds Bonds as securities depository. "Paying Agent" shall mean Bankers Trust Company, or such successor as may be approved by Issuer as provided herein and who shall carry out the duties prescribed herein as Issuer's agent to provide for the payment of principal of and interest on the Bonds as the same shall become due. "Project" shall mean the costs of aiding in the planning, undertaking and carrying out of urban renewal projects under the authority of Iowa Code chapter 403 and the Urban Renewal Plan for the Grundy County Annex Urban Renewal Area, as amended, including demolition of a current aged structure and construction of a new Grundy County Courthouse Annex to house services including, but not limited to, Mental Health, General Assistance, Chemical Dependency, Juvenile Court Services, Human Services and Public Health. "Project Fund" shall mean the fund required to be established by this Resolution for the deposit of the proceeds of the Bonds. "Rebate Fund" shall mean the fund so defined in and established pursuant to the Tax Exemption Certificate. "Registrar" shall mean Bankers Trust Company of Des Moines, Iowa, or such successor as may be approved by Issuer as provided herein and who shall carry out the duties prescribed herein with respect to maintaining a register of the owners of the Bonds. Unless otherwise specified, the Registrar shall also act as Transfer Agent for the Bonds. "Resolution" shall mean this resolution authorizing the Bonds. "Tax Exemption Certificate" shall mean the Tax Exemption Certificate approved under the terms of this Resolution and to be executed by the Treasurer and delivered at the time of issuance and delivery of the Bonds. "Treasurer" shall mean the County Treasurer or such other officer as shall succeed to the same duties and responsibilities with respect to the recording and payment of the Bonds issued hereunder. Section 2. Levy and Certification of Annual Tax. Other Funds to be Used. a) Levy of Annual Tax. The levy for the purpose of providing funds to pay the principal and interest of the Bonds hereinafter authorized to be issued, there is hereby levied for each full year the following direct annual tax on all of the taxable property in Des Moines, Iowa, to-wit:

"Payable from available cash on hand. (NOTE: For example, the levy to be made and certified against the taxable valuations of January 1, 2015 will be collected during the fiscal year commencing July 1, 2016.) b) Resolution to be Filed With County Auditor. A certified copy of this Resolution shall be filed with the Auditor of Grundy County, Iowa and the Auditor is hereby instructed in and for each of the years as provided, to levy and assess the tax hereby authorized in Section 2 of this Resolution, in like manner as other taxes are levied and assessed, and such taxes so levied in and for each of the years aforesaid be collected in like manner as other taxes of the County are collected, and when collected be used for the purpose of paying principal and interest on said Bonds issued in anticipation of the tax, and for no other purpose whatsoever. c) Additional County Funds Available. Principal and interest coming due at any time when the proceeds of said tax on hand shall be insufficient to pay the same shall be promptly paid when due from current funds of the County available for that purpose and reimbursement shall be made from such special fund in the amounts thus advanced Section 3. Bond Fund. Said tax shall be assessed and collected each year at the same time and in the same manner as, and in addition to, all other taxes in and for the County, and when collected they shall be converted into a special fund within the Debt Service Fund to be known as the "GENERAL OBLIGATION BOND FUND NO. 2" (the "Bond Fund"), which is hereby pledged for and shall be used only for the payment of the principal of and interest on the Bonds hereinafter authorized to be issued; and also there shall be apportioned to said fund its proportion of taxes received by the County from property that is centrally assessed by the State of Iowa. Section 4. Application of Bond Proceeds. Proceeds of the Bonds, other than accrued interest except as may be provided below, shall be credited to the Project Fund and expended therefrom for the purposes of issuance. Any amounts on hand in the Project Fund shall be available for the payment of the principal of or interest on the Bonds at any time that other funds shall be insufficient to the purpose, in which event such funds shall be repaid

to the Project Fund at the earliest opportunity. Any balance on hand in the Project Fund and not immediately required for its purposes may be invested not inconsistent with limitations provided by law or this Resolution. Section 5. Investment of Bond Fund Proceeds. All moneys held in the Bond Fund, provided for by Section 3 of this Resolution shall be invested in investments permitted by Chapter 12B, Code of Iowa, 2015, as amended, or deposited in financial institutions which are members of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation and the deposits in which are insured thereby and all such deposits exceeding the maximum amount insured from time to time by FDIC or its equivalent successor in any one financial institution shall be continuously secured in compliance with Chapter 12C of the Code of Iowa, 2015, as amended, or otherwise by a valid pledge of direct obligations of the United States Government having an equivalent market value. All such interim investments shall mature before the date on which the moneys are required for payment of principal of or interest on the Bonds as herein provided. Section 6. Bond Details, Execution and Redemption. a) Bond Details. General Obligation Urban Renewal Bonds of the County in the amount of \$1,150,000, shall be issued pursuant to the provisions of Sections 331.443 and 403.12 of the Code of Iowa for the aforesaid purposes. The Bonds shall be designated "GENERAL OBLIGATION URBAN RENEWAL BOND, SERIES 2016B", be dated August 23, 2016, and bear interest from the date thereof, until payment thereof, at the office of the Paying Agent, said interest payable on June 1, 2017, and semiannually thereafter on the 1st day of June and December in each year until maturity at the rates hereinafter provided. The Bonds shall be executed by the manual or facsimile signature of the Chairperson and attested by the manual or facsimile signature of the Auditor, and impressed or printed with the seal of the County and shall be fully registered as to both principal and interest as provided in this Resolution; principal, interest and premium, if any, shall be payable at the office of the Paying Agent by mailing of a check to the registered owner of the Bond. The Bonds shall be in the denomination of \$5,000 or multiples thereof. The Bonds shall mature and bear interest as follows:

b) Redemption. i. Optional Redemption. Bonds maturing after June 1, 2023, may be called for optional redemption by the Issuer on that date or any date thereafter, from any funds regardless of source, in whole or from time to time in part, in any order of maturity and within an annual maturity by lot. The terms of redemption shall be par, plus accrued interest to date of call. Thirty days' written notice of redemption shall be given to the registered owner of the Bond. Failure to give written notice to any registered owner of the Bonds or any defect therein shall not affect the validity of any proceedings to bear interest after the specified redemption date, provided funds for their redemption are on deposit at the place of payment. Written notice will be deemed completed upon transmission to the owner of record. If selection by lot within a maturity is required, the Registrar shall designate the Bonds to be redeemed by random selection of the names of the registered owners of the entire annual maturity until the total amount of Bonds to be called has been reached. If less than all of a maturity is called for redemption, the Issuer will notify DTC of the particular amount of such maturity to be redeemed prior to maturity. DTC will determine by lot the amount of each Participant's interest in such maturity to be redeemed and each Participant will then select by lot the beneficial ownership interests in such maturity to be redeemed. All prepayments shall be at a price of par plus accrued interest. Section 7. Issuance of Bonds in Book-Entry Form; Replacement Bonds. a) Notwithstanding the other provisions of this Resolution regarding registration, ownership, transfer, payment and exchange of the Bonds, unless the Issuer determines to permit the exchange of Depository Bonds for Bonds in Authorized Denominations, the Bonds shall be issued as Depository Bonds in denominations of the entire principal amount of each maturity of Bonds (or, if a portion of said principal amount is prepaid, said principal amount less the prepaid amount). The Bonds must be registered in the name of Cede & Co., as nominee for DTC. Payment of semiannual interest for any Bonds registered in the name of Cede & Co., will be made by wire transfer or New York Clearing House or equivalent next day funds to the account of Cede & Co. on the interest payment date for the Bonds at the address indicated or in the Representation Letter. b) The Bonds will be initially issued in the form of separate single authenticated fully registered bonds in the amount of each stated maturity of the Bonds. Upon initial issuance, the ownership of the Bonds will be registered in the registry books of the Bankers Trust Company kept by the Paying Agent and Registrar in the name of Cede & Co., as nominee of DTC. The Paying Agent and Registrar and the Issuer may treat DTC (or its nominee) as the sole and exclusive owner of the Bonds registered in its name for the purposes of payment of the principal or redemption price of or interest on the Bonds, selecting the Bonds or portions to be redeemed, giving any notice permitted or required to be given to registered owners of Bonds under the Resolution of the Issuer, registering the transfer of Bonds, obtaining any consent or other action to be taken by registered owners of the Bonds and for other purposes. The Paying Agent, Registrar and the Issuer have no responsibility or obligation to any Participant or Beneficial Owner of the Bonds under or through DTC with respect to the accuracy of records maintained by DTC or any Participant; with respect to the payment by DTC or Participant of an amount of principal or redemption price of or interest on the Bonds; with respect to any notice given to owners of Bonds under the Resolution; with respect to the Participant(s) selected to receive payment in the event of a partial redemption of the Bonds, or a consent given or other action taken by DTC as registered owner of the Bonds. The Paying Agent and Registrar shall pay all principal of and premium, if any, and interest on the Bonds only to Cede & Co. in accordance with the Representation Letter, and all payments are valid and effective to fully satisfy and discharge the Issuer's obligations with respect to the principal and premium, if any, and interest on the Bonds to the extent of the sum paid. DTC must receive an authenticated Bond for each separate stated maturity evidencing the obligation of the Issuer to make payments of principal of and premium, if any, and interest. Upon delivery by DTC to the Paying Agent and Registrar of written notice that DTC has determined to substitute a new nominee in place of Cede & Co., the Bonds will be transferable to the new nominee in accordance with this Section. c) In the event the Issuer determines that it is in the best interest of the Beneficial Owners that they be able to obtain Bonds certificates, the Issuer may notify DTC and the Paying Agent and Registrar, whereupon DTC will notify the Participants, of the availability through DTC of Bonds certificates. The Bonds will be transferable in accordance with this Section. DTC may determine to discontinue providing its services with respect to the Bonds at any time by giving notice to the Issuer and the Paying Agent and Registrar and

discharging its responsibilities under applicable law. In this event, the Bonds will be transferable in accordance with this Section. d) Notwithstanding any other provision of the Resolution to the contrary, so long as any Bond is registered in the name of Cede & Co., as nominee of DTC, all payments with respect to the principal of and premium, if any, and interest on the Bond and all notices must be made and given, respectively to DTC as provided in the Representation letter. e) In connection with any notice or other communication to be provided to Bondholders by the Issuer or the Paying Agent and Registrar with respect to a consent or other action to be taken by Bondholders, the Issuer or the Paying Agent and Registrar, as the case may be, shall establish a record date for the consent or other action and give DTC notice of the record date not less than 15 calendar days in advance of the record date to the extent possible. Notice to DTC must be given only when DTC is the sole Bondholder. f) The Representation Letter is on file with DTC and sets forth certain matters with respect to, among other things, notices, consents and approvals by Bondholders and payments on the Bonds. The execution and delivery of the Representation Letter to DTC by the Issuer is ratified and confirmed. g) In the event that a transfer or exchange of the Bonds is permitted under this Section, the transfer or exchange may be accomplished upon receipt by the Registrar from the registered owners of the Bonds to be transferred or exchanged and appropriate instruments of transfer. In the event Bond certificates are issued to holders other than Cede & Co., its successor as nominee for DTC as holder of all the Bonds, or other securities depository as holder of all the Bonds, the provisions of the Resolution apply to, among other things, the printing of certificates and the method of payment of principal of and interest on the certificates. Any substitute depository shall be designated in writing by the Issuer to the Paying Agent. Any such substitute depository shall be a qualified and registered "clearing agency" as provided in Section 17A of the Securities Exchange Act of 1934, as amended. The substitute depository shall provide for (i) immobilization of the Depository Bonds, (ii) registration and transfer of interests in Depository Bonds by book entries made on records of the depository or its nominee and (iii) payment of principal, premium, if any, and interest on the Bonds in accordance with and as such interests may appear with respect to such book entries. h) The officers of the Issuer are authorized and directed to prepare and furnish to the purchaser, and to the attorneys approving the legality of Bonds, certified copies of proceedings, ordinances, resolutions and records and all certificates and affidavits and other instruments as may be required to evidence the legality and marketability of the Bonds, and all certified copies, certificates, affidavits and other instruments constitute representations of the Issuer as to the correctness of all stated or recited facts. Section 8. Registration of Bonds; Appointment of Registrar; Transfer; Ownership; Delivery; and Cancellation. a) Registration. The ownership of Bonds may be transferred only by the making of an entry upon the books kept for the registration and transfer of ownership of the Bonds, and in no other way. Bankers Trust Company is hereby appointed as Bond Registrar under the terms of this Resolution and under the provisions of a separate agreement with the Issuer filed herewith which is made a part hereof by this reference. Registrar shall maintain the books of the Issuer for the registration of ownership of the Bonds for the payment of principal of and interest on the Bonds as provided in this Resolution. All Bonds shall be negotiable as provided in Article 8 of the Uniform Commercial Code and Section 331.446 of the Code of Iowa, subject to the provisions for registration and transfer contained in the Bonds and in this Resolution. b) Transfer. SECTION 2. AMENDMENT. The Official Zoning Maps of Ordinance No. 2009-5 Grundy County, Iowa, Development Ordinance are hereby amended by reclassifying of the following described real property from an A-1 Agricultural District to M- Manufacturing for purposes of allowing Boulder Contracting to operate a contracting business: Parcel 37-B located in the S 1/4 1/2 SW 1/4 of Section 19, Township 87 North, Range 7-6, West of the 5th P.M. as shown in Book 13-G, Page 182 of the County Recorder's Office.



Remove pie crust from refrigerator and warm to room temperature, about 15-20 minutes. Unroll crust and place it on large baking sheet. Arrange sliced apples on crust, leaving about two inches of space around

edge.
Chop cold butter into small bits and scatter over apples. Mix sugar and cinnamon together and sprinkle over apples. Fold two-inch section of open pie crust over apples – this will not cover apples, but contain them inside crust.

Bake 20-25 minutes until crust is golden brown and apples are just soft.

A recent University of Iowa grad and Cedar Rapids Gazette intern has been named regional sports editor at The Grundy Register and Parkersburg Eclipse News-Review.
