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Major expansion underway at Heartland Co-op

GRUNDY CENTER- Heartland Cooperative Grain Vice President Todd Phillips doesn't use the phrase "Keeping Up with the Joneses" to describe his employer's construction of four new 78-foot in diameter grain bins in Grundy Center: in his view, it's simply a boon for local farmers and the community.

"I can't speak to that. What I can speak to is our commitment to Grundy County and ultimately the Tri-County area. We've been pioneers in growing our company," he said in response to a question about similar projects at Mid-Iowa Cooperative north of Grundy Center and Snittjer Grain in Wellsburg. "We do our own thing, and Grundy County has always been part of our plans."

When it's all said and done, the new bins will hold a grand total of 1.7 million bushels

(pushing the company's total Grundy Center storage capacity to 2.3 million bushels), and Heartland is expected to invest around \$6.5 million toward the remodel of the facility on the north edge of town. The project also includes a new dryer and two new receiving pits that will increase the capacity by 30,000 bushels per hour.

"We're absolutely dedicated to this area, and we have a strong producer and customer base there already," Phillips said. "They want more speed and space so that they can get back to the field. So it's a good fit for us, and we're excited about it."

A host of factors have contributed to the dramatic surge in the need for grain storage: as most everyone with at least a cursory knowledge of the industry knows, commodity

Neighboring landowners battle over proposed rural housing development

CEDAR FALLS- For as long as government has existed in the United States, one of its primary functions has been to balance the rights of private property owners against those of the people surrounding them and the public interest. What, then, happens when the parties involved reach a zero sum difference of opinions?

Darrell Sloth, Nick Heine, John Oltman and Russ Roberts, all of whom live along V Avenue between Dike and New Hartford in rural Grundy County, are adamant that the four-lot housing development their neighbor Jami Fettkether wants to build by clearing eight acres of wooded area and converting it from A-1 agricultural to R-2 "suburban" residential land would have negative repercussions both for them and for the future of the county itself.

"If you let in a little conclave of houses here in the middle of an R-1 section, what's to stop this from happening in Shiloh Township, or down in Black Hawk Township, or Colfax Township or some other place where it's the same kind of situation?" Sloth asked. "How do you tell them they can't do it when you told this person they could do it?"

According to the opposition, the county's guidelines from 2009 stipulate that new homes

in unincorporated areas should be set on at least 35 acres of land (preferably on paved roads), and that land should have a corn suitability rating (CSR) below 80. Already, nine homes—the newest of which was constructed in 2005—sit along the narrow stretch of gravel in question, which includes an aging bridge erected in the 1930's. Heine even offered to purchase the land but was allegedly informed that the plans had already been made.

Sloth, who grows corn and soybeans in several of the adjacent fields, also worries about more non-farm residents uninitiated with the unique challenges that tractors, sprayers and combines can present moving in across the road on land with an 86 CSR.

Still, none of these factors dissuaded a majority of the Grundy County Planning and Zoning Commission members in attendance at last week's hearing from granting Mr. Fettkether their blessing after nearly 45 minutes of debate. Tiffany Carson, Steve Robertson and Nick Haupt supported the rezone application, while Brittnei Curren and David Minter voted against it.

The landowner, on the other hand, told the board that he had "no other choice in terms of adding value to the parcel be

City of Dike aims to abate downtown nuisance property

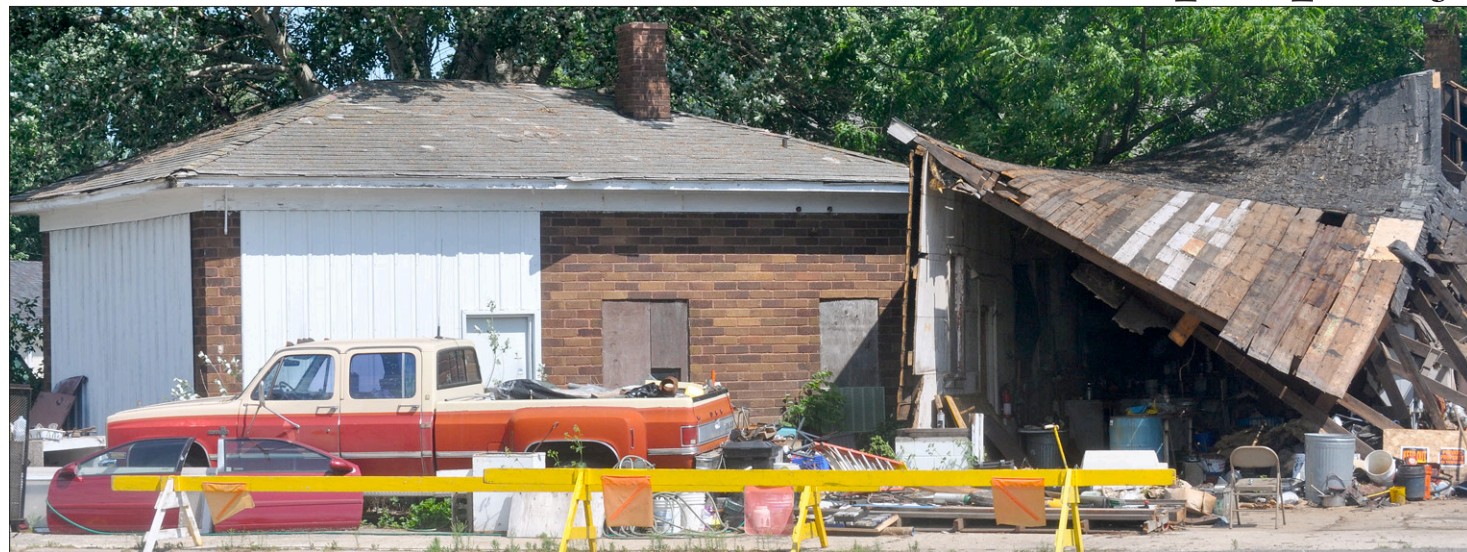

DIKE- Like most eyesore properties in most small towns, discussions regarding Marcus Miller's now-shuttered auto body shop on State Street in Dike have been ongoing for years without any substantial, permanent resolution. Will this time around be any different?

City officials are hoping so. They're currently in the process of abating the nuisance, and Miller has until June 15 to satisfactorily tidy up the area before further litigation could be initiated.

"This isn't anything we wanted to do, but he's just gotten really behind again," Mayor Mike Soppe said. "He's always come in when we've asked and cleaned it up. We're just asking him to do it all the time now."

Locals know the property for its collapsed roof along with scattered junk and vehicles sit-

ting out front, and Soppe and the current city council addressed the issue yet again at the most recent meeting. Unsurprisingly,

the matter is also listed on the preliminary agenda for the next gathering on Wednesday, June 13.

The mayor reiterated, however, that all communications between the two parties to this point have been civil in nature,

and while no one is pleased with the current situation, he's

GC officials pitch public art to supervisors

GRUNDY CENTER- Grundy Center Main Street Director Lisa Bienfang and city councilwoman Amanda Grineski addressed the board of supervisors about a unique proposal aimed at bringing in more outside visitors and sprucing up the county seat: public art.

"We're looking for something that not only beautifies the alleyways but adds culture and livelihood to our communities," Bienfang said. "There's a lot of opportunity to not only bring culture and art to the area, but to get people involved as well."

The new initiative, known as Alley CATS (Community Art Through the Streets), is open ended at this point, and local artist Grant McMartin has agreed to work on the first mural during Felix Grundy Days next month. Bienfang told the board that she found inspiration during a recent visit to Le Mars in northwest Iowa, where the city is working to clean up blighted areas. No official action was taken.

County Sanitarian Carie Sager reported that Gregory Risse, the owner of a property in Fern recently declared a public health nuisance, is no longer incarcerated, has been served papers and

GC council approves change to sanitary sewer policy

GRUNDY CENTER- The Grundy Center city council voted 3-1 to change a policy on sanitary sewer systems and allow shared lines at multi-residential condominiums and town houses during its regular meeting on Monday night.

Supporters of the new rule argued that it would encourage more development locally and streamline the installation process after the city received a request to allow the shared lines at the Prairie View addition. The current code requires a service line for each unit.

"I think if you're going to do it, you've got to do it for the whole town," Mayor Al Kiewiet said. "Do we want to start changing our codes all the time? That's the question I have."

Public Works Director Dan Bangasser opined that the update actually didn't constitute a major change and did not apply to apartment buildings (which only have one sanitary sewer line) or neighboring property owners.

"This is going to increase your tax base. This is the type of housing that's being demanded," said Grundy Center Main Street Board President and Development Corporation member Paul Eberline. "We want to have Grundy Center to be available to grow."

A motion to approve the change eventually carried 3-1, as Amanda Grineski, Butch

Kuester and Chad Hemann supported it, and Dave Steff dissented. Janet Miller-Buck was absent.

Bangasser reported that a major upheaval could be on the horizon for the collection of recycling, as Cedar Valley Recycling and Transfer has announced that it will no longer work with the city due to difficult financial circumstances in the industry.

"They don't want plastic or cardboard. There's no market for it," Bangasser said. "I don't know if there is (anything that is) lucrative right now."

The council also approved a resolution approving the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) contract with the Iowa Economic Development Authority for the upper story-housing grant at the former Frederick's building and a res-

olution authorizing a contract with the Iowa Northland Regional Council of Governments (INRCOG) to administer the grant.

Near the end of the meeting, Grineski briefly discussed the public art proposal that she and Main Street director Lisa Bienfang had brought to the county board of supervisors earlier in the day, and they hope to have made substantial progress in time for the Felix Grundy Festival.

IN OTHER BUSINESS, the council:

- Reappointed Taylor Appel to the board of adjustments.
- Approved the yearly cash transfers for FY2018.
- Approved cigarette licenses for both Casey's stores, Scotty's Saloon, Brother's Market and Dollar General.

MESA, AZ.- As someone who grew up in an era known for small, diversified family farming operations and financially thriving print media outlets, Parkersburg native Lawn Griffiths can be forgiven for waxing a bit nostalgic these days. The times have changed.

"One of the things I'm happy with is that I got to work in newspapers before they all went electronic and all went digital," he said. "At the *Courier*, we were hot metal... man, that smell of ink was one of the first things that drew me to journalism."

In his memoir, *Batting Rocks Over the Barn: An Iowa Farm Boy's Odyssey*, Griffiths explores his upbringing in rural Grundy County (a true newspaper guy, he doesn't fail to mention that his late father Paul ran frequent ads in *The Grundy Register*), his humble journalistic origins with the *Eclipse* and a career that led to a long stint at the *Waterloo-Cedar Falls Courier*—working his way up to farm editor and state

Griffiths reflects on farm upbringing, newsroom career in memoir

editor—before he moved on to the Phoenix area and retired at a paper in Mesa.

Griffiths, who received his degree from Iowa State University after graduating high school in 1964, was eventually drafted out of the Peace Corps and into the Army, completing a two-year stint and using the GI Bill to earn a Master's from Northwestern University. In 1972, he settled in about 20 miles from where he grew up, and that first job in Waterloo set him on a course that led him to rub elbows with famous luminaries like Mother Teresa and the Dalai Lama.

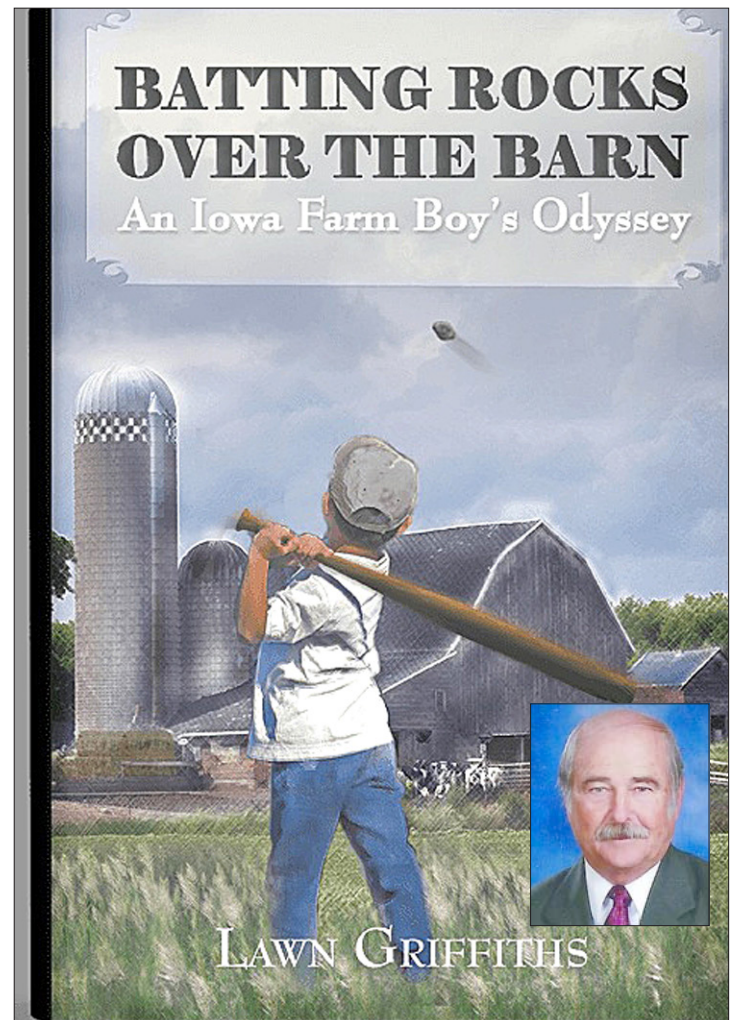
Amidst all of the current turmoil and a certain ongoing investigation into untoward behaviors at the highest levels of government, it's hard to ignore the fact that Griffiths came onto the scene during the same year that the Watergate scandal broke.

"We followed that closely, and it was kind of the inspiration for our era," he said.

One of the memories that will always stick with Griffiths is a Jesup woman who was held hostage by the government of Ayatollah Khomeini in Iran during the last year of Jimmy Carter's presidency, and the young newsman developed a strong bond with her family that resulted in a series of intimately crafted, richly reported stories and a chance to meet the Iowan when she returned home.

The Pulitzer Prize-winning reporter Richard Whitt, who won the award while working for the *Louisville Courier-Journal* and reporting on a fire that killed 164 people in the Cincinnati suburb of Southgate, preceded Griffiths at the *Courier* and provided a template for success in a notoriously cutthroat industry.

Batting Rocks Over the Barn is primarily a collection of weekly columns Griffiths wrote for the

Courier as farm editor, recalling a simpler time growing up on 340 acres while raising small herds of cattle, chicken and hogs. As agriculture has modernized and moved more toward mass production, it's become hard to recognize, and so, Griffiths adds, have newspapers.

Interested readers can find the

book, which is being reprinted through a new publishing house after it was first released in 2015, on Amazon or www.lawngriffiths.com. And for those who want to follow in Griffiths's footsteps, his advice is simple: start reading, and ignore the detractors.

"Read, read, read all you can. Find what excites you, and become an authority and expert in that area," he said. "Facebook will never get the job done. I'm so sick of hearing about fake news and all of that kind of thing."

doing everything he can to reach an amicable resolution. “I’m sure (Miller) is frustrated. There are city council members who have dealt with it as long as I’ve dealt with it that are a little frustrated, (and) I’m sure there are people who live nearby that are frustrated,” Soppe said. “Something needs to change.”
An attempt to reach Miller at his listed phone number was

met with a notice that it had been disconnected, and city attorney Gary Jones of Cedar Falls had not responded to a request for comment at press time. According to the Grundy County Beacon website, the property is worth a net assessed value of \$16,210, and Miller does not currently owe any back taxes on it.
As Dike, with its proximity to a larger metropolitan area and prime location along High-

way 20 in northeastern Grundy County, continues to grow, Soppe admitted that plots like Miller’s can create quite a headache for officials such as himself, neighbors and parents who worry about a potential public safety hazard for their children. “We want (Miller) to have a successful business, but at the same time, it’s got to represent our goals as a community,” he said.

is attempting to rectify the matter—particularly an open septic tank that a neighbor’s dog fell into and the lack of any indoor plumbing. He now has until September 1 to do so.
“I can tell that some things have been moved around, but it’s still a mess,” Sager said. “I hope he cleans it up and the county doesn’t have to worry about it. But we’ll see how that goes.”
The fine for a nuisance violation is \$750, and after 60 days of nonpayment, additional expenses can be imposed. The Risse home has become infam-

ous in the area due to squalid living conditions, a high volume of police and ambulance calls, a yard full of hazardous materials and frequent noise complaints.
The supervisors voted unanimously to recommend the approval of an application for a two-building hog site in Colfax Township just south of Highway 20 on 170th Street, and the Hockemeyer family owns the land in question. It received a passing score of 460 points in the master matrix, and the nearest house is nearly 3,000 feet away.
After a plan to rezone an eight-acre parcel of wooded

land between Dike and New Hartford and section off four housing lots received narrow approval from the Planning and Zoning Commission last week, the supervisors will make their determination after a public hearing on Monday, June 18, at 9:00 a.m.

- Approved a fireworks permit application for 4G Pyrotechnics.
- Approved the hiring of Jane Bryngelson of Conrad to clean the Secondary Roads office.

sides a livestock feeding operation, which he has no desire to build (Fettkether, who works for Lockard Construction in Cedar Falls, is not a farmer by trade). And contrary to the claim that it violates the development ordinance, Fettkether argues that if the area were rezoned, it would fall well within the acceptable uses of an R-2 district.
“This, we feel, is the best option with residential homes that fits the community we’re in. The struggle we have is (that) under A-1, the items you can do are animal confinements, which destroy the natural resources and aren’t very neighborly,” Fettkether said. “If I left it A-1, the only options that are financially feasible lean that direction, and that’s not what we want to do.”
He added that the new homes would be developed under strict sustainability guidelines to minimize the environmental impact, and one of the lots will be donated to a nonprofit agency to help a family purchase a home.
“We believe it’s a great thing for others to enjoy (the area) similar to the way we have and to be out in the country,”

Fettkether said. “We really believe that... We have eight acres of timber land that offer an opportunity for controlled growth in the county and to utilize underutilized land that we have.”
Now, the final decision will come before the board of supervisors, a five-member unit that in recent years has generally favored economic development and anything that generates more tax revenue in the long run. Chuck Bakker, who represents the northeast corner of the county, told The Grundy Register that he would wait until next public hearing on Monday, June 18, to publicly state his opinion but offered praise of the current rules, particularly the 35-acre guideline.
“I’m happy with what the ordinance says,” he said. “I’m very happy with the ordinance in that manner, and I would have to be convinced to stray away from it.”
If the whole song and dance sounds familiar, it’s because the exact same situation unfolded once before in 2005: Dharma and Vern Petersen, the previous landowners, brought a similar proposal to the zoning board, and it was summarily rejected by a unanimous vote. The

neighbors, however, aren’t taking the past ruling as any sort of reassurance, and Oltman even contended that Carson, a real estate agent in Grundy Center, introduced a motion to approve the application before allowing everyone to speak.
“It goes against all of the guiding principles that they’ve adopted, and it appears that they’re just ignoring them,” he said. “In fact, when we were (at the zoning hearing), each of us spoke, and it was quite obvious that they didn’t even listen to us. We had no impact.”
In the meantime, Oltman and those who share his concerns are getting their message out the old-fashioned way: talking to the media, writing letters to the editor and to the board of supervisors, and passionately making their case to anyone willing to listen. It remains to be seen if they’ll have any luck swaying the individuals with the final say.
“We live out here because we want to live in open country,” Oltman said. “If we wanted close neighbors, we could move to town.”

prices are down even as production and yields exponentially increase. As a result, more farmers are opting for storage in hopes of a market rebound, and seed corn production in Grundy County—generally known as a hub for the practice—has also decreased.
Thus, Heartland, which also operates area facilities in Reinbeck, Holland, Lincoln and Traer, is adjusting to the new reality accordingly, and executives are hopeful that the revamped Grundy Center elevator will be fully operational for this fall’s harvest.
For Phillips and his colleagues, the project represents a

perfect opportunity to reach out to potential customers and make the pitch as to why they should choose Heartland.
“We’ve always been a company that tries to be a partner in marketing. We’re not always going to be the highest price... (but) if they look at it as a partnership and a long term relationship, I think they’ll see that Heartland Co-op stands above,” he said. “(The expansion is) a good thing for the company. It’s a good thing for the farmer. It’s a good thing for the community, and it’s a good thing for the county.”

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My Three Cents Worth

In appreciation of Senator David Johnson

Perhaps due to the fact that he had a tendency to show up unannounced at meetings halfway across the state, I had the honor of meeting State Senator David Johnson (I-Ocheyedan) on multiple occasions, and I always left our encounters vaguely optimistic that lawmakers who spoke freely, acted in the public interest and refused to box themselves in with the Democrats or Republicans on every issue weren't a completely extinct species.

As it turns out, my hope may have been misplaced. Last week, citing the prospect of an almost certain defeat in a far northwest Iowa district that makes Grundy County feel like San Francisco by comparison and a desire to spend more time with his disparate family, Johnson officially threw in the towel.

The former newspaperman and dairy farmer will wrap up a nearly 20-year political career when he leaves the Capitol in January, but as you may know if you've heard the name, he'll always be remembered for the last two.

In 2016, the generally straightforward conservative left the GOP over its wholehearted embrace of then candidate and now Tweet-er-in-Chief Donald Trump, and he's been an unapologetic pariah ever since, ruffling the feathers of his former colleagues over agricultural policy, the state's financial outlook and a ban on so-called "sanctuary cities."

What happened next won't surprise anyone. Johnson was stripped of his committee assignments, completely ostracized from the partisan cliques that have come to define Des Moines and called everything from Benedict Arnold to Judas among the faithful back home in a Dutch Reformed area still struggling to cope with the very existence of homosexuals.

"Your personal decision left us, as chairs, past chairs, central committee members for over 18 years, in a situation where we cannot, and will not, in good faith, continue to support you as our senator," a group of local Republican leaders wrote in a 2016 letter printed in the uber-conservative *N'West Iowa REVIEW*. *"You recklessly abandoned your party, your supporters, your constituents and your friends by declaring a 'no affiliation' status."*

It all makes perfect sense. Nothing says stringent social conservatism like supporting Trump. But Johnson, in his own way, persevered even as he became keenly aware that his days were numbered: he had the nerve to question the Iowa GOP's cozy relationship with the Farm Bureau, criticized a water quality bill that lacks any benchmarks or enforcement, lamented the legislature's enthusiastic union-busting and pointed out the obvious insanity of a tax plan that blows a massive hole in the budget.

Rest assured, whoever takes Johnson's seat, whether it's Steve King protégé Zach Whiting, Spirit Lake pizza executive Brad Price or Emmetsburg entrepreneur Jesse Wolfe (though, I should add, Whiting is far and away the worst of the three options), will almost certainly *stick to the script* like the famous drill sergeant from "Full Metal Jacket" is standing behind him preparing a lashing for the moment he doesn't.

If Johnson's ordeal has taught us anything, it's that leaving one of the two major parties in a country where the founders vigorously denounced such a system is the cardinal sin of politics—not violating every basic norm of human decency and presidential decorum, making up the rules as you go, admiring murderous, autocratic dictators from afar or turning the average press conference into an episode of "Jerry Springer" full of people wearing expensive suits instead of sweatpants and oversized flannel shirts.

Progressives can find plenty to hate about the outgoing Senator: he's always been firmly pro-life, and he once told a Waterloo teacher who e-mailed him about a lack of new money for school districts to "quit whining." He's nobody's darling. He's also nobody's skill.

But Johnson never consulted a focus group before getting in front of a podium, never worried about how his donors would feel and, thanks to his media background, never shied away from an opportunity to stir the pot. He was an unvarnished, unfiltered original, and in the end, that made him unelectable.

The only advice I can give to the aggrieved masses clamoring for more scalps in the wake of the "Roseanne" cancellation is this: spare us all the fake outrage.

Liberals, it's absolutely true that your media personalities have a free pass to write or yell whatever they want about Donald Trump. The only one who's faced real backlash is Kathy Griffin, and while she undoubtedly has the right to carry around a fake severed head, most people would agree that she crossed a pretty clear line there.

Beyond that, Stephen Colbert, Jimmy Kimmel, Bill Maher, Samantha Bee, Keith Olbermann (side note: relax deplorables, he'll get himself fired again soon enough) and John Oliver are still on the air and still spouting off about the president whenever they get the chance—as they should be. If the bosses of their private companies decide to can them, that's their call.

And conservatives, don't act as if your senses are suddenly irreversibly offended after you held your noses and voted for a man best known for the "Access Hollywood" tape and using social media as a cudgel in repeated attempts to delegitimize the views of anyone who doesn't completely agree with him. You got what you paid for, and we're now stuck in a never-ending vicious cycle of crude insults and moronic "Whataboutism" as a means of excusing undeniably racist language.

A prime local example of the phenomenon is right wing *Waterloo-Cedar Falls Courier* columnist and UNI Professor Dennis Clayson, who's in hot water after publishing a Men's Rights screed decrying the "toxic femininity" of modern America and proclaiming that "only a re-introduction of masculine values will save us."

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Grassley Q & A: Eye on Opioid Crisis

Question: How serious is the nation's opioid crisis?

Answer: The impact of this expanding, pervasive addiction spans the social-economic spectrum in American society, tearing apart families and creating a consequential public health crisis in its wake. For the first time ever, drug overdoses are the leading cause of death for Americans under age 50. If that doesn't get your attention, consider the eye-opening revelation that U.S. life expectancy has dropped for the first time in decades. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) attributes the second consecutive yearly decline to a 21 percent rise in the death rate from drug overdoses. The CDC also reports that two-thirds of drug overdose deaths between 2015 and 2016 involved opioids. And it's happening right here in Iowa. The Iowa Department of Health estimates more than 200 Iowans died from opioid misuse last year. One fatality from a drug overdose is one death too many. In recent years, the proliferation of prescription pain killers to treat chronic pain fueled a cycle of dependence and overdose deaths. In 2012, U.S. health care providers wrote 259 million prescriptions for opioid painkillers. As more opioid pain killers found their way into home medicine cabinets, the risk for misuse climbed and a cycle of addiction grew into a crisis. According to the CDC, prescribing practices are becoming more restrictive and some providers are showing leadership by decreasing the number of prescriptions for opioids. The American Medical Association reports a 22 percent drop in national opioid prescriptions by physicians over a four-year period. In addition, the American Dental Association announced a new policy that includes limits on the amount of opioids prescribed by dentists. However, as prescribing methods tighten, users are turning to cheaper alternatives such as heroin and synthetic opioids, including fentanyl and methamphetamines. As a result, mortality rates from opioid-related overdose continue to climb.

Question: What is Congress doing to help turn the tide in local communities?

Answer: Drug addiction and overdose deaths are not a partisan issue. Illicit drug use and drug disorders are a humanitarian crisis that are devastating to American households, the workplace and

neighborhoods. Criminal drug trafficking rings and methamphetamine distributors have long peddled poison in local communities across Iowa. The human toll and harm to public safety continues despite orchestrated efforts by community coalitions to strengthen prevention, treatment, recovery and enforcement. The opioid crisis places a heavy burden on social services, emergency rooms and local law enforcement. Congress has enacted two major laws that address the opioid crisis, including resources for prevention and prescription monitoring programs, addiction treatment and public health measures to address drug abuse, misuse and overdose. I'm glad to report more help is on the way. As chairman of the Judiciary Committee, I recently secured approval for another five bipartisan bills that will steer more resources for social services, health providers and law enforcement to address substance abuse and addiction in local communities and to stop the flow of illicit controlled substances. That makes 10 bills I am leading or co-sponsoring in the 115th Congress to help turn this dangerous tide. The package of bills includes measures requiring drug companies to publicly disclose payments made to nurse practitioners and physician assistants; boosting participation in the drug take-back program to collect expired or unneeded prescription painkillers; tracking data on pharmacies and medical providers to prevent illegal sales of prescription painkillers; providing resources for families to stay intact when one member is participating in a drug treatment program; streamlining record-keeping protocol for substance abuse disorders in Medicaid to compile better data on what works and what doesn't; and, improving access to substance abuse treatment via telehealth technology for Medicare recipients and by increasing access to in-patient services. Solving this crisis will take an all hands on deck effort to raise public awareness. There is no quick fix or magic wand that will make the pain and addiction go away. As your Senator, I am also aware of the needs of Iowans who suffer from pain. That is why I support efforts such as those at the National Institutes of Health to find new non-opioid pain treatments. As a society, we can't afford to ignore this problem. The gist of the crisis boils down to this blunt truth: it's a matter of life and death.

Within the next couple of weeks, the Grundy County Board of Supervisors will be considering the rezoning of a parcel of ground in section 22 of Fairfield township from A-1 to R-2. This parcel is the eight acre wooded area of an established acreage. The owners of the property wish to divide this parcel into four residential lots. The Planning and Zoning Commission, believing the wooded area having no value, approved this application.

They rejected the concerns of neighbors and adjacent farm operators in introducing four new residences in this small area. They are establishing an eight acre R-2 Zone in the middle of an A-1

Zone. They failed to recognize the protection of the A-1 classification gives to the surrounding farm ground. I believe this will set a dangerous precedent if the supervisors agree and approve this rezoning request.

Any acreage with more than four non-crop acres would be eligible for subdivision into two acre residential lots. It creates the potential for residential subdivisions scattered throughout the county. If such an outcome also concerns you, please contact your supervisor to reject this rezoning request.

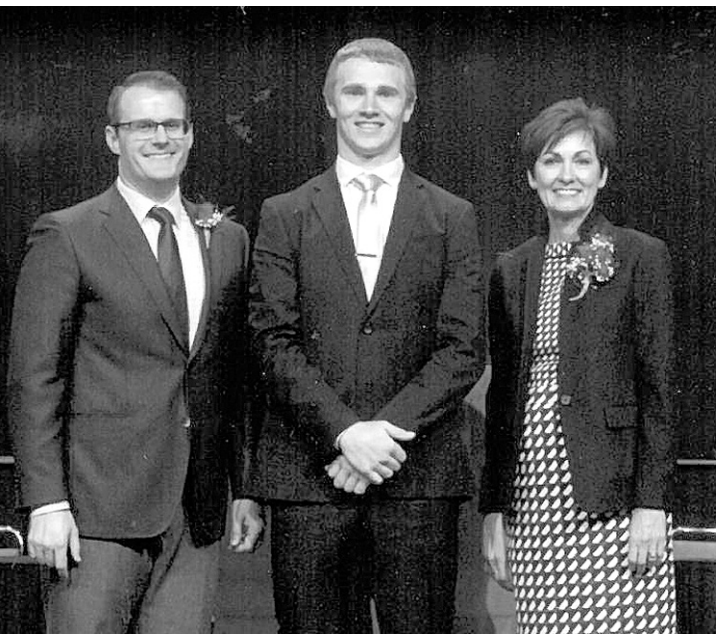

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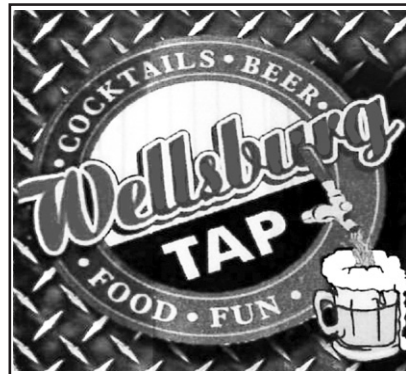

The Plan provides that the County may issue bonds or use available funds for purposes allowed by the Plan and that tax increment reimbursement of the costs of urban renewal projects may be sought if and to the extent incurred by the County. The Plan initially proposes no specific public infrastructure or site improvements to be undertaken by the County, and provides that the Plan may be amended from time to time. Any person or organization desiring to be heard shall be afforded an opportunity to be heard at such hearing.

New wind farm project expected to reach 100 percent renewable energy goal

MidAmerican Energy is on its way to a major milestone in renewable power.

On Wednesday, May 30, MidAmerican Energy formally announced a proposal for their Wind XII project, a \$922 million expansion of their wind generated power capability.

The appropriately named Wind XII project is the twelfth major wind energy project since the company started building wind farms in 2004. Since then, the continual expansion of wind farms has generated thousands of megawatts of power in Iowa.

Two years ago, as development began on the Wind XI project, MidAmerican Energy set a goal for themselves of generating enough electricity using renewable energy to meet 100 percent of the needs for their Iowan customers. Once completed in 2020, Wind XII is projected to generate 591 megawatts of electricity, which will increase MidAmerican Energy's output of renewable energy to reach that goal.

"It's a capstone of our efforts since the early 2000s to be a leader in renewable energy," said Adam Wright, President and CEO of MidAmerican Energy, during the



announcement conference. "If the project is approved, and once completed, it will allow our customers to get 100 percent of their annual energy use from a clean, renewable, cost effective source."

The \$922 million project is a major investment in the state, but Wright was adamant that the project will not result in a rate increase for their customers. On the contrary, Wright credited the company's investment in wind energy as part of the reason they've been able to keep their rates 37% lower than the national average.

"With wind, we don't need to buy fuel to make the energy," said Wright.

Wright also credits wind development for allowing MidAmerican Energy to reduce their carbon by half since 2003.

If approved by the Iowa Utilities Board, the Wind XII project will be completed in 2020, utilizing more than 300 full-time construction jobs during that time and creating 28 full-time positions to operate and maintain the wind farm once it's up and running.

No sites have been chosen yet,

but once a location is set, Wind XII is projected to produce an average of \$6.9 million a year in property tax and \$5.6 million more in land-owner easement payments.

"Reaching 100 percent renewable energy is absolutely the best path to provide our customers a sustainable energy future," said Wright. "Those benefits are very simple and very clear."

AGWSR pitcher piling up strikeouts by the fistful

GLADBROOK – AGWSR’s Taryan Barrick had to work through some pain at the end of her sophomore season. She was adding a rise ball to her pitching repertoire, but by the end of the year she had developed some tendonitis in her elbow.

Barrick still ended her season strong, finishing atop Class 1A with 258 strikeouts even though the Cougars fell one win short of the state tournament.

This summer, she’s feeling better and she’s once again filling the stat sheets in the pitcher’s circle.

As of Monday, June 4’s stats collected on quikstatstio-wa.com, Barrick had the most strikeouts of any pitcher in the state with 107 Ks in 53 and one-third innings pitched.

That includes 14 strikeouts in Class 1A No. 12 AGWSR’s 10-0 victory against Gladbrook-Reinbeck in Gladbrook last Thursday.

She’s ahead of her pace from last season, averaging about 14.1 strikeouts per 7 innings pitched compared to a 12.1 K/7 ratio last season.

“I’ve been throwing pitches throughout the season and off-seasons and getting used to the momentum of it,” Barrick

said. “I’m pretty confident in myself, confident in my team behind me, just have to throw the ball like normal.”

Barrick walked just one Rebel on Thursday, allowing no hits in five innings of work as a six-run explosion in the fourth inning helped the Cougars end the game early.

Makenna Kuper, who led off the game with a home run, was 2 for 3 at the plate, driving in two runs and scoring three times. Ali Gerbracht had three RBI on two hits, including a triple, and Sammi deNeui, Carrington Hunt and Haley Bakker all drove in a run each.

“We hit the ball hard the first couple of innings,” AGWSR co-head coach Scott O’Brien said. “Middle we went into a bit of a funk but by the end we were hitting the ball hard. Some of them may get caught but we just hit the ball hard and had good at-bats.”

Gladbrook-Reinbeck first-year head coach Collin Arndt admitted the Rebels’ biggest challenge was Barrick.

“That’s probably the best pitcher we’ll see all year long and we play in a loaded conference,” Arndt added. “We’ll be seeing better pitchers like that all year and I’m glad we saw one tonight to get us started off.”

On the heels of a 1-23 sea-

son last summer, Arndt wanted to make sure the Rebels could win the small battles in G-R’s first game of the season.

“Rachel [Cooley] threw a lot of strikes and coming into the year we knew she was high on walks last year,” Arndt said. “That was the best part of the night was how Rachel executed.”

The Cougars went on from this game on Thursday to face some tough competition in a North Fayette Valley tournament over the weekend, but left with a big victory over 1A No. 1 Lansing Kee, with Barrick throwing 13 strikeouts.

The goal is to be ready for the postseason this time around and make sure the Cougars can punch their ticket to Fort Dodge, Barrick said.

“We know we can do it,” she added. “It’s just a matter of how we come together and transfer it over.”

CENTER POINT – The Grundy Center/Gladbrook-Reinbeck girls soccer team didn't back down from a monumental challenge on Friday.

But Class 1A No. 6 Center Point-Urbana cashed in on their opportunities more often than the Rebels, and that ultimately meant the difference in a 2-0 victory for the Stormin' Pointers at CPU Field in Fross Park in a 1A regional semifinal.

"We told the girls from the beginning that we needed to come out guns blazin'," GCGR head coach Aaron Mara said. "We knew CP-U wasn't going to sit back and wait for us to come to them."

The Rebels possessed the ball well for most of the first half and were aggressive out of the gate in the second half, but GCGR often were unable to put a shot on net as the Rebels worked for a good look.

CP-U struck first in the 34th minute on a goal from Adriana Katcher. Abigail Weideman would add the insurance goal in the 50th minute after the Pointers weathered GCGR's second-half attack, which included a couple good looks at the net from freshman Jacque Kuester.

Friday was the end of the road for GCGR seniors Audrey Leyen and Megan Swanson and manager Sadie Brockett. The regional semifinal was the second game back for Leyen after missing four weeks with a torn calf.

"[Brockett's] there helping me 24/7, so I'm really losing three important girls," Mara said. "Megan's the anchor on the back, she pretty much plays 80 minutes a night and does everything she can. ... Audrey up top, she came back to us on Tuesday for the first-round district game and we saw it as an opportunity to get her back in the game."

Leyen was one of six GCGR girls on the second-team all-dis-

trict as chosen by the Iowa Girls Coaches Association, joining goalkeeper Carsen Hamann, Kuester, Maddie McMartin, Swanson and Sydney Mathews.

The Rebels, ending this season at 9-7, will have a strong senior class next spring that Mara said has been the foundation of the team in recent seasons, though he is looking to the future to step up more as well.

"We've asked a lot of Jacque, Belen [Ellenberger] and even Lyndi [Bowen] got in toward the end of the season to give us some minutes," Mara said. "But we knew with our upperclassmen that have been playing all the time for the last two three years and threw in freshman that could contribute we knew we had something special. ... Our future's bright, we have an eighth-grade class coming up that's hungry and wants more so it'll be very interesting next year how things come out."

D-NH's Weber nabs 2A individual title

PANORA — Morgan Weber was struggling.

The Dike-New Hartford sophomore had just made back-to-back bogeys and a par on the back nine of her round at the second day of the Class 2A state golf tournament last Wednesday, and Weber said she figured she was backpedaling too much from Tuesday's three-stroke first-day lead.

Weber followed her two-over-par stretch with a bad tee shot, but before she could get too down on herself, her coaches, looking to give one last confidence boost, spilled the beans.

"Coach said, 'Morgan, you have an 8-stroke lead,'" Weber said. "I chilled out a bit."

Weber went one-under par the rest of the way, adding an even bigger cushion to her final two-day total of 148, following a 75 with a 73 for the 2A individual title at Lake Panorama National Golf Course. Garner-Hayfield-Ventura's Bailee Frayne was the runner-up with a 160.

She's the first individual champion in Wolverine girls history — D-NH won the 2A team title in 2014. Her 36-hole total is also tied for the 10th-lowest in state tournament history.

The win was also the second individual golf title of the season for D-NH golf after Bo Weissenfluh wrapped up the boys' title in 2A shooting 144 in Marshalltown last Friday. That's the eighth time that a single school has produced the boys and girls individual medalists, and the first since 2015, when Emily Snelling and Dane Waldron of Clear Lake won their

respective tournaments.

Weber was third as a freshman at the Class 3A tournament in Panora with a 160.

"There's a lot of great golfers here and it's going to be hard every year because everybody wants to win," Weber said. "It was really exciting to have that experience to be down there again and leave with a win."

Already a three-stroke leader in the clubhouse after the first 18 holes, Weber started on the back nine on Wednesday with two birdies, finishing with a 36 that was two strokes better than her performance on the back

half the day prior.

"It was never-wracking to have that [first day] lead," Weber said. "You don't want to lose that lead but it was still exciting."

Weber was consistent on the front nine, taking the two back-to-back bogeys but collecting a birdie on the sixth hole to come in with a one-over 37 on the front nine on a day where her closest competition faded off for what was a convincing victory.

A month before Weber's triumph, though, she was competing as part of the Club Iowa

(CIA) 18s club at a national junior volleyball championship event in California.

Weber hadn't gotten a lot of time on the links prior to leaving for California due to inclement weather that truncated a lot of spring sports, and while she was gone Dike-New Hartford rescheduled most of their meets for the week she was vacant.

She got back at 1 a.m. the night before her return to the lineup against Sumner-Fredricksburg.

"No practice at all," Weber said. "Just went out there and tried to do my best."

She shot a 2-over par 38 to claim meet medalist honors as D-NH defeated the Cougars.

D-NH's coaching staff deserves extra credit in producing two individual state champions, Weber said.

"This year we had, like, 30 more boys out for golf, and only four coaches to go around," Weber said. "They did a good job of getting around to helping everybody, helping their swings and chips, learning the basics, and it all went from there."

Weber's had a busy sophomore year — she was on the court for D-NH's latest volleyball state title as well as a key contributor to the Wolverine girls' long-awaited trip to state girls basketball. But she said she got a lot of motivation from those around her on the course.

"My coaches really pushed me, and also my family," Weber said. "Every time I go out on the driving range or to play to have one of them out there with me to help me get it as good as possible, they're a lot of help."

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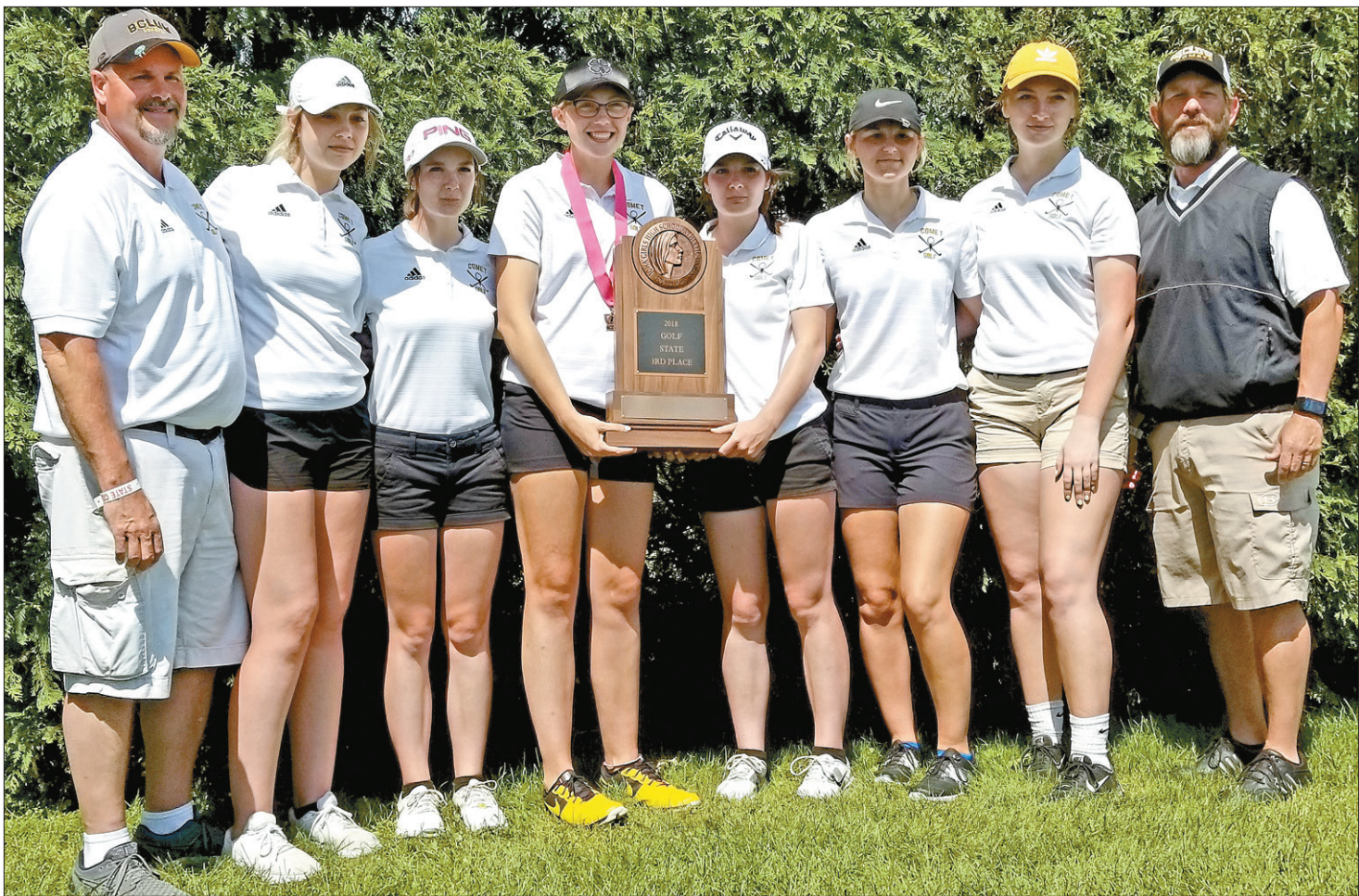
